Reading Log Requirements and Book Log Questions for 7th Grade ELA

Reading grades are determined by **several different criteria**: Literature circles, book reports, class work, class participation, and number of books/articles/poems read per trimester are a few of the assignments students will be graded on. Students MUST read at least 3 novels and at least 1 poem or newspaper article each trimester.

It is within the students' power to receive the grade s/he wants for the number of

books read per trimester and the number and quality of questions answered.

EXTRA CREDIT **MAY BE** GIVEN IF STUDENT READS MORE THAN THE REQUIRED NUMBER OF ITEMS.

Every book/newspaper article/poem the student reads must be logged each day. Every day, the student must write a paragraph about what they read. After completing the book the student must answer I of the following prompts in a one-page essay format. Each prompt should be answered AT LEAST once per trimester.

FOR NOVELS (100 page minimum)

- 1. Find 1-2 examples of facts in the book and discuss their significance to plot development. Find 1-2 examples of opinions given by the characters in the book and explain how they show a character's personality and/or development. If the book is fiction, describe how certain elements in the plot are purely fictional (i.e. things that couldn't possibly happen in reality). Then, describe how other elements could happen in reality.
- 2. Part 1: Identify each main character, his/her perspective and explain how the author developed his/her perspective in the story. Use 2 examples from the text for each character. Explain the author's point of view. How is the story told? 1st Person or 3rd Person? Limited or omniscient? List examples to validate your opinion.
 - <u>Part II</u>: Identify at least two forms of figurative language used by the author (i.e. idioms, metaphors, similes, alliteration, personification, hyperbole). Correctly cite the text with in text citation and explain in your own words what the author was conveying.
- 3. Summarize the plot of the book in a plot map showing the exposition, rising action, climax, falling action, and resolution. (In the Exposition section, specifically show how the setting of the story shapes the character and the plot). In each section of the plot map, show how the theme or central idea was introduced and developed throughout the story. Then, write a 1 to 1 ½ page essay summarizing the novel.
- 4. Compare and contrast your current book with a different book you read that has a similar theme. You should have at least 3 comparisons and 3 contrasts. If your current book was portrayed as something else (e.g. a play, movie, T.V. show/series, newspaper article, poem, etc), compare and contrast the book with its other form of media.

After reading a poem or article, the student must answer the corresponding prompts in a one-page essay format.

FOR POETRY (100 words minimum) Attach a copy of the poem to you essay & answer BOTH questions in the form of an essay.

- I. Identify vocabulary words used in this poem; describe their meaning and their meaning in context. Identify figurative language the poet used (similes, metaphors, idioms, symbolism, etc) and analyze what the poet meant by using them: what was s/he trying to describe and why did s/he describe in this way?
- 2. Identify the impact of rhymes and other repetitious sounds used: Why did the poet use this and how did this increase/decrease the value of the poem in your eyes?

Identify the form of the poem: Was it a narrative? A ballad? An epic poem? A soliloquy? Analyze how the type of poem contributes to its meaning. (e.g. A sonnet is a poem about love and so reading Shakespeare's sonnet 18 about comparing something to a summer's day, I can see he's comparing the woman he loves to the beauty of summer in the following ways (etc)...).

FOR NEWSPAPER/MAGAZINE ARTICLES (250 words minimum) Attach a copy of the article with your essay.

Choose three of the following prompts for each article you read as the three paragraphs of your essay. Do NOT use the same three prompts each time.

- 1. What is the main bias and idea in this article? Use several examples from the text as well as your own inferences drawn from the text.
- 2. Find 2 or more main ideas of the article and show how these ideas develop from the beginning of the article to the ending. Also, summarize the whole article WITHOUT stating yours or the author's biases.
- 3. What was the interaction between the people in your article, the events that happened to/around them and the ideas from the author him/herself? How did all these work together? (e.g. How did the person's ideas influence how they acted?)
- 4. Analyze the structure of the article (e.g. graphics, headers, captions) and how the author uses these plus major sections to create an article. Also, explain how the author develops his/her ideas.
- 5. What is the author's point of view and bias? What is his/her purpose of writing this article? How does the author distinguish her/her position from others?
- 6. Trace and evaluate an argument or stance in an article (e.g. find each claim, proof, reason, example, etc) and decide if the claims are reasonable or not and also if the evidence they use is relevant (important and true) and enough to support each claim.
- 7. What type of article are you reading? Expository or Persuasive? How do you know? If expository, list 3 facts the author presents. If persuasive, what is the main argument? Also, list 3 claims the author uses to support his/her argument.

Daily Reading Log Options

In addition to reading 30 minutes every day and keeping a reading log, you are required to write a paragraph on the day's reading.

Below are options for you to choose from to write for your daily reading.

- Make an inference about a character as you read using textual evidence. (I can infer
 that _____ because the text states _____.) Please go into detail about why you are
 making the inference.
- 2) Write down one word or phrase from your reading that you are not sure about and/or has a connotative or figurative meaning. Write down what the word or phrase actually means and how you can make a connection with the word or phrase and how can it be used in your vocabulary.
- 3) Write your opinion on what was read. Your opinion can be about an action a character took or about the writing itself, was it vivid, were you able to follow along with the events. What did or didn't the author do to help with this? What *could* the author have done to help?
- 4) Write an objective summary of the section read. Write about what really happened in the text without using your opinion or personal feelings.
- 5) Write down a line of dialogue from your reading that you feel is significant to the story. What does that line of dialogue reveal about the character who said it? How was the character feeling at the time? What were the circumstances? Why is it significant?
- 6) What is one conclusion you can draw from your reading tonight? Use evidence from the text to support your thinking.
